Are there accessible parking spaces?			
Are the accessible parking spaces close to the entrance?

Is there signage directing someone from the accessible pa	arking area to an accessible entry?		
Is the area to load and unload from public (buses) or private vehicles accessible?

Walkways and Sidewalks			
Is there a ramp at the crosswalk or edge of the parking lot with raised bumps that indicates			
there is a transition from the sidewalk to the street. This is also called a curb cut.

Is the walkway to the building clear of debris?

Is the walkway clear of obstructions, such as benches, tras	sh cans, plants, or signs?		
Is the sidewalk at least 36 inches wide with no obstructions? Planters, benches, and similar			
items can be on the sidewalk, but they cannot intrude on the 36-inch width.

Is there an accessible route to an accessible entrance?			
Is there a sign that directs people to the accessible entrance? Even if the main entrance is			
accessible, it should have a sign indicating it is accessible.

Ramps and Stairs			
If there are steps to the entrance, is there a ramp that meets ADA requirements? Ramps must have a maximum of 12 inches of run to every 1 inch of rise. In other words, a ramp cannot be higher than 1 inch for every 12 inches of length.

Is the doorway or entrance at least 32 inches wide?

Does the door have a handle or latch that can be opened with one hand or opened without tight grasping, pinching, or twisting of the wrist?

Interior Spaces and Doorways					
Are interior doorways at least 32" wide?					
Do interior doors have levers or door handles that can be opened with one hand, or can be open without tight grasping, pinching or twisting of the wrist?					
Is the route through the space at least 36 inches wide? If there are retail racks, tables, desks, etc. the route through needs to be at least 36" wide					
Are there objects in the public areas, such as drinking fountains, fire extinguishers, plants, sign, etc. that protrude into the pathway?

If there are interior ramps, do they meet the ADA requirements?

Do the interior ramps have handrails?					
If a person is seated in a wheelchair or on a scooter, can they reach the light switches?					
Elevators					
Is there an elevator to access other floors?					
Are there signs directing people to the elevator?					
Look inside the elevator. Are the buttons accessible to someone who is seated in a wheelchair or scooter?

Do the elevator buttons have Braille as well as visible numbers?					
Restrooms					
If restrooms are available to the public, is there at least one toilet room that is accessible?					
Is there a sign that directs people to the accessible restroom?					
Is there an accessible toilet, mirror, sink, soap, towel dispenser and trash receptacle?

Does the sink area have space for a wheelchair to roll under the counter to access the soap and water?
