Job 1. Ohio 4-H Club Foundation totals \$159,158.97 (see map)

Income from the foundation since 1947 totals \$46,431.22

Expenditures have included:

1400 advisors to 7 State Advisors Conferences -	\$28,569.03
700 advisors to 4 District Advisors Conferences -	6,384.38
150 scholarships to Buckeye Recreation Workshop -	3,155.00

The original goal for the 4-H Foundation was \$200,000.00. A total of 51 counties have completed their quota. The principal is deposited with the State Treasurer and is drawing six percent interest.

The Foundation was set up to promote leadership development. The Executive Council of the Foundation have favored district advisors conferences and have approved such conferences for Northwest and Southeast in 1956. Similar conferences might be held in Northeast and Southwest in 1957. Quotas to the State Conference at Club Congress may be lowered to accommodate more member delegates.

LET'S FINISH THE JOB.

Job 2. National 4-H Club Foundation total \$2,891.47 (see map)

Projects of the National Foundation include the National 4-H Center, the I.F.Y.E. program, and a 4-H research program. The 4-H Clubs of the United States assumed the responsibility of raising 10 cents per member to purchase the Center as a site for National Camp and other Extension Groups. The Chevy Chase Junior College was purchased in 1951 for \$361,500.00.

The armed forces have been renting the Center temporarily. The mortgage has been paid but additional funds will be needed for new construction. A total of 38 Ohio counties have made some contribution to the Center. LET'S FINISH THE JOB. Ohio's quota is \$6,803.00. Twenty-five states have completed their quota.

Send contributions to the State 4-H Office payable to the National 4-H Club Foundation.

Job 3. A. B. Graham Portrait Fund totals \$624.36 (see map)

Dedication services for the portrait were held at the Youth Center at the Fairgrounds on August 26, 1955. Expenditures to date include \$136.48 for newspaper mats and publicity, \$175.00 for a frame and the balance to the artist.

The 4-H Clubs assumed the obligation of raising at least one cent per member with any surplus above actual expenses to be given to the Ohio 4-H Foundation. A total of 46 counties have made some contribution. LET'S FINISH THE JOB=

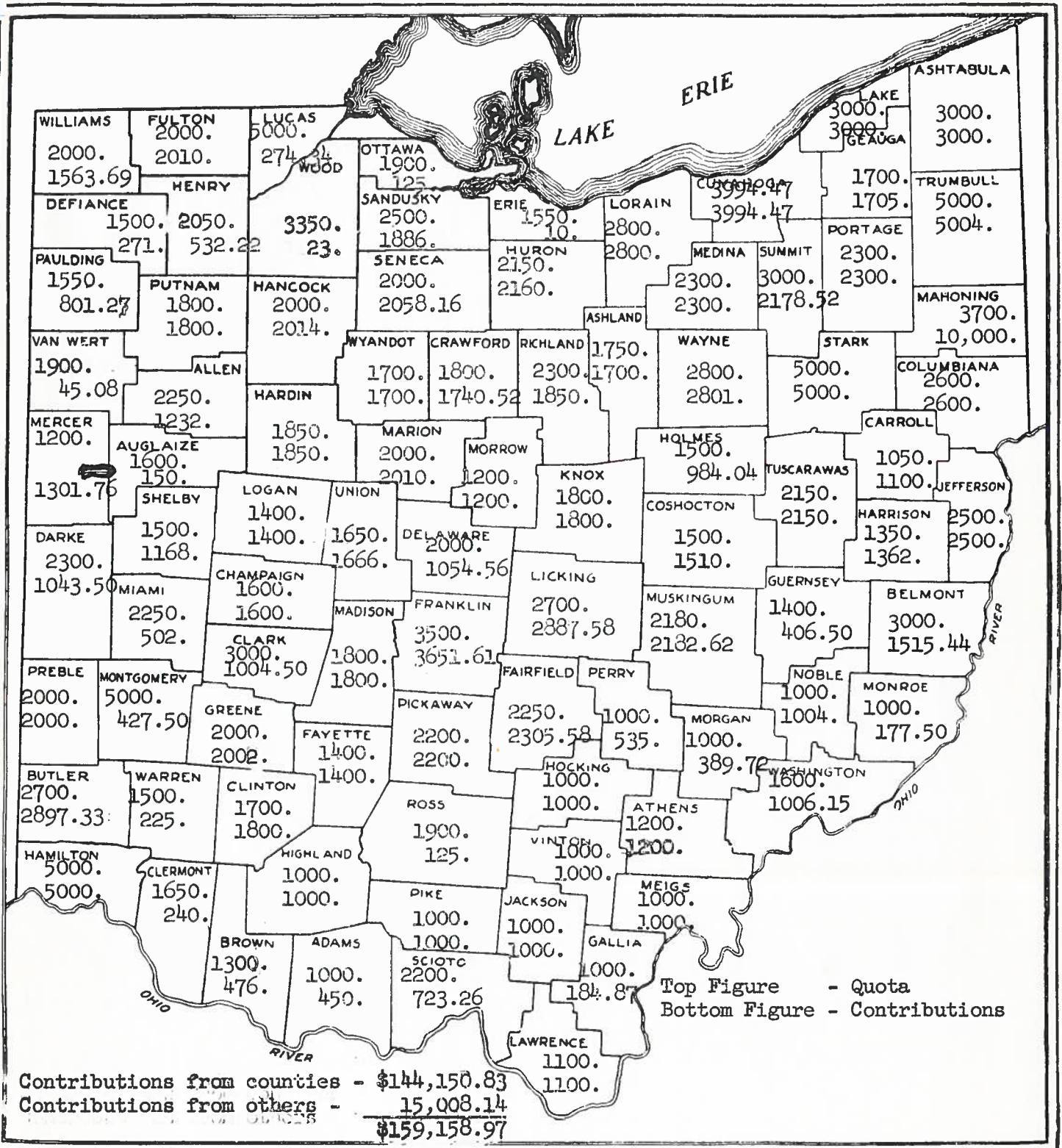

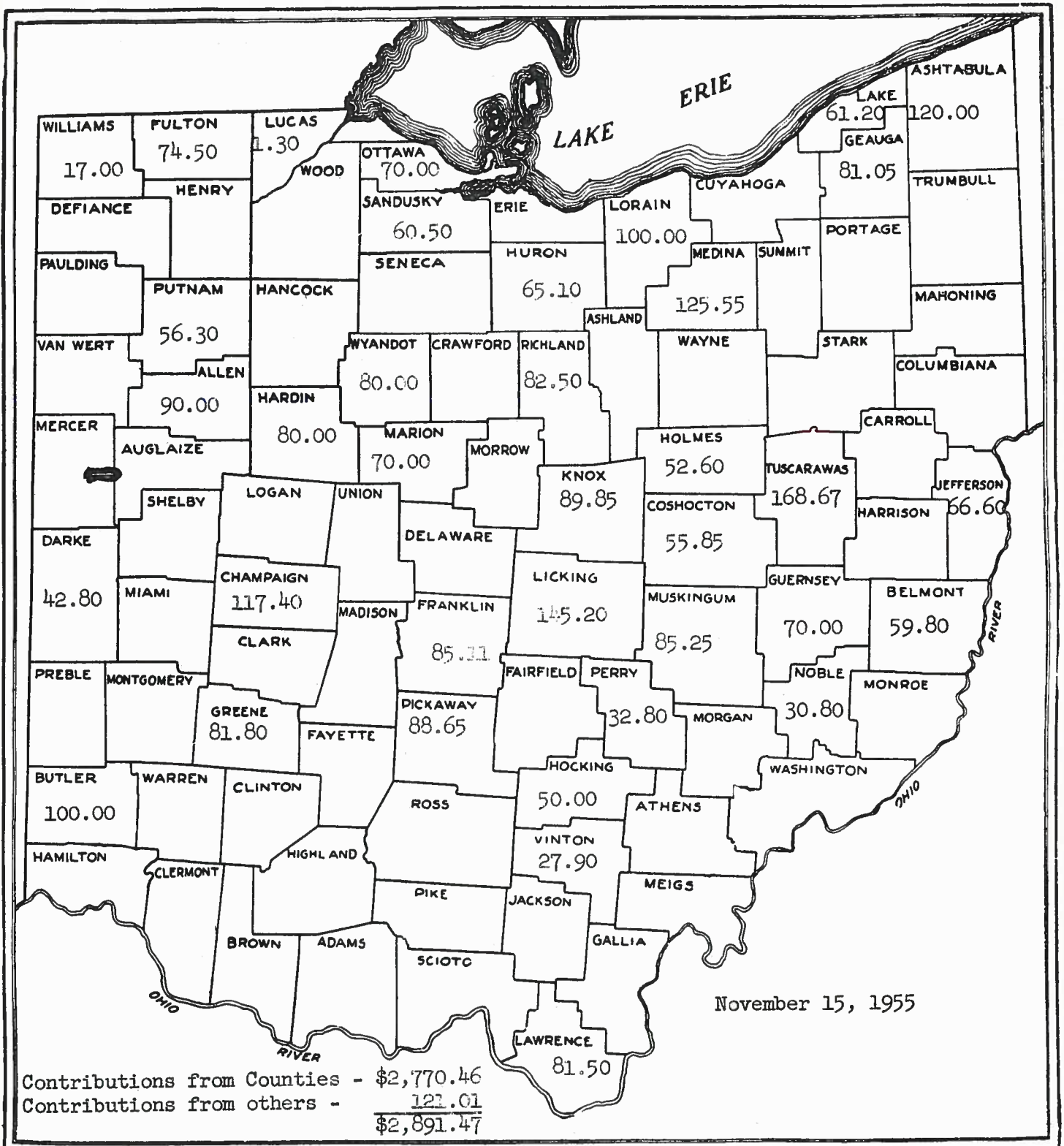

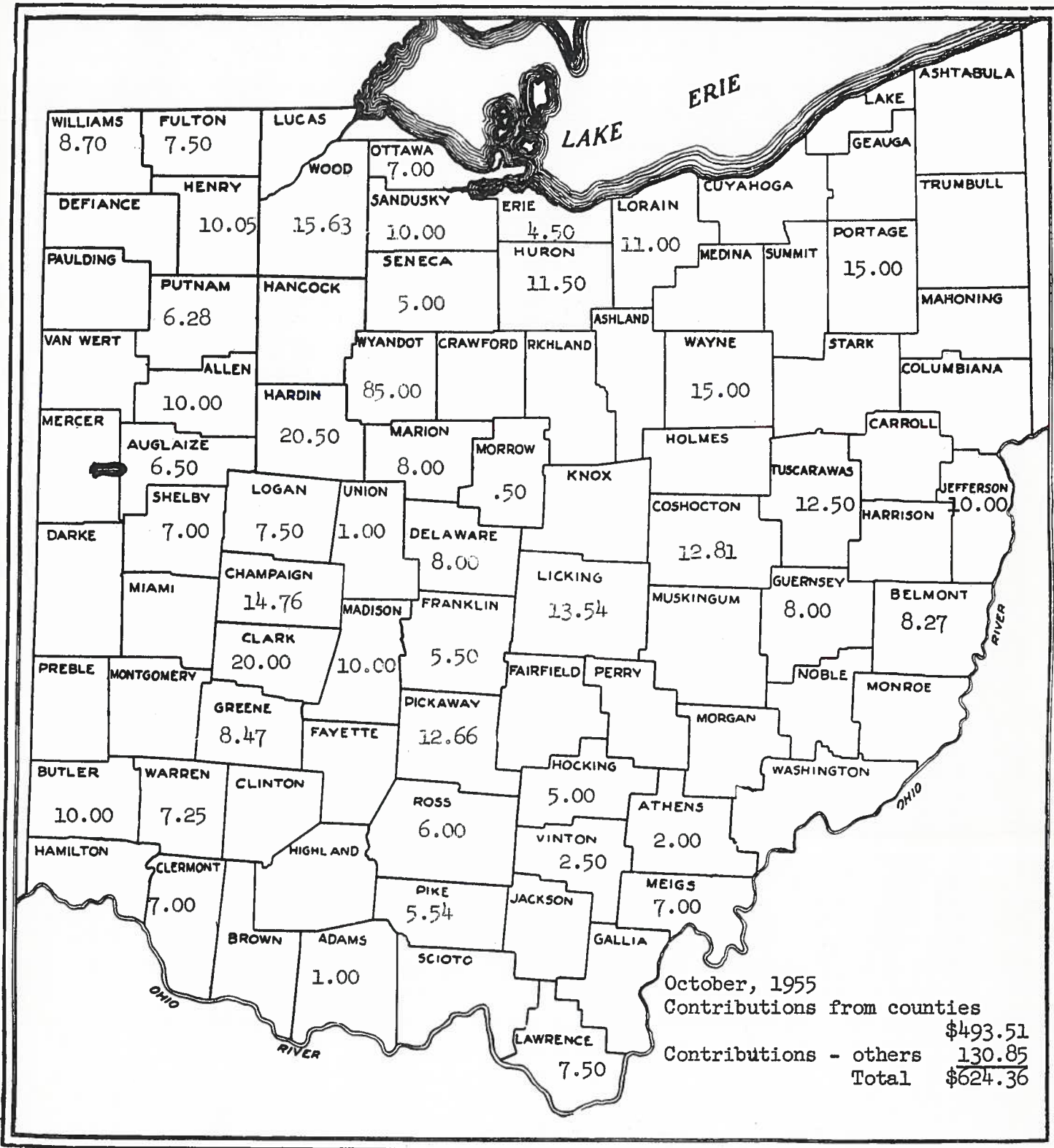
