## My Horse University

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## Materials/Equipment Needed:

- · 1 white cone
- · 1 orange cone
- · 2 black feed tubs
- · grain

Note: Colored buckets placed upside down can substitute for cones.

## Procedure:

- 1. In a small paddock, set the white cone next to a feed tub and the orange cone next to a feed tub.
- 2. Only put feed in the tub next to the orange cone.
- 3. Repeat this approximately five times. (The number of times will depend on the horse.)
- 4. After approximately five times of feeding, try moving the tubs and cones around. The horse will go to the one next to the orange cone each time.

Results: If the horse goes to the feed tub by the orange cone, it indicates that the horse can distinguish between orange and white.
